Dr. Roy Giroux '55

Colleges honour him and faculty respect him. The Board of Trustees at Central Michigan University presented the former Assumption grad (class of 1955) in October 2005 and currently the Humber College Vice-President Emeritus, Dr. Roy Giroux (PhD) with an honorary doctorate for his creation of graduate programs at Humber and other colleges across Ontario.

In his youth, Roy excelled in baseball and hockey and was signed by the Chicago Cubs. After a couple of years in the minors, Giroux re-evaluated his options and decided to hit the books rather than continue hitting baseballs. His post sports career lead to degrees from the University of Windsor (BA), McMaster University (B.P.E.), Wayne State University (M.Ed. and Ph.D.).

Roy has held teaching positions at Assumption College High School, Riverside Secondary School, and administrative positions with the Windsor Board of Education and St.

Clair College where he was Vice-President and Dean of Community and Industrial Services. From 1983 until his unofficial

retirement in

1996 he held the position of Vice-President, Educational and Faculty Services at Humber. He continues today as lecturer throughout the province of Ontario.

ROBERT CAYEA, '62 Awarded Governor General's Medal

During his time at Assumption High School, he thoroughly enjoyed the atmosphere and spirit of this great school. As he had to work at the school to cover some of his tuition, he had very little time to be involved in extra curricular activities. He did, however, get involved in all intramural sports and was a member of the Assumption Glee Club in grades 9 and 10. After school, he had a part-time job at Dominion Store at the corner of Huron Line and Tecumseh Road which helped cover the balance of his tuition. He graduated from Assumption in 1962 and went to the newly opened Windsor Teachers College. After two years, he received his teaching certificate at which time he began his teaching career at St. Patrick School in the Sandwich West Separate School Board. There he met his wife, Suzanne, and in 1967, they were married. He retired from the Windsor-Essex combined Roman Catholic Separate School Board in 1998 having served his later years as Vice Principal and Principal.

He joined the Knights of Columbus at St. Joseph Council 5642 in 1975 and immediately got involved in the executive of his council. After living in LaSalle for 6 years, his wife, daughter and he moved to Forest Glade in Windsor at which time he transferred to Bishop John T. Kidd Council 4924 and rose through the ranks to the position of Deputy Grand Knight. His son Gregory was born in 1978. He was then asked to help form a parish based council at Church of the Atonement in 1985 and was elected Charter Grand Knight. He joined the 4th Degree and is presently a member of the Fr. Alphonse Kirckhaert Assembly 2289. He served for over two years as Grand Knight at which time his newly formed council received the honour of being selected as the Best Overall Council in Ontario.

He served as District Deputy of the newly formed District 76 and won Star District every year. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus 1st, 2nd and 3rd Degree initiation teams and served as Captain of the Tri-County team for 8 years. At the provincial level, he served as State Squires Chairman, Basketball Free Throw Chairman and Substance Abuse Programme Chairman. He was elected to the Ontario State Board in 1994, rose through the chairs and was elected State Deputy of Ontario in 2002. At the Supreme Convention in August 2003 in Washington, D.C., he was elected as Supreme Director and serves on the Youth and Athletics Committee and Emergency Disaster Relief Committee.

He has served his parish as a lector, a Eucharistic Minister, a member of the Parish Advisory Committee and a member of the church and Knights of Columbus choir. Presently he serves on the Board of Directors of St. Peter's Seminary Foundation Board for the London Diocese.

He has served his community as the President of the Windsor-Essex Branch of the Arthritis Society and the Board of Directors of the Arthritis Society Ontario Division. He served as the President of the Windsor School Safety Patrol Association and still assists them today. In 1992, he was awarded the Governor General's Medal for Community involvement.



A Loving Voice From Brazil

As a former history teacher and supporter of Fr. Armstrong's missions at Assumption in the 1980s, I never imagined I'd one day be a missionary in Brazil.

I first went to Brazil during the summer of 1992 for

a visit with our young sisters, Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. I returned to join the mission among the poor in Sao Paulo, Brazil in 1994 and have been there ever since. I have tried to be open to God's call and to the needs of the people around me.

Sao Paulo is a huge city of some 18 million where tremendous wealth exists alongside striking poverty and slums. I live on the city periphery and work in a large parish which contains 15 ecclesial base communities which just keep growing.

I began helping in an adult literacy program as so many young adults especially those who migrated from rural areas, never had an opportunity to go to school. It was rewarding to see these women and young people gaining confidence as they learned to read and write. Many later entered the school system and some have since graduated from high school. They taught me a lot about patience and perseverance.

With time I became more actively involved in pastoral work: visiting families, recruiting and preparing catechists, coordinating a popular theology course and promoting bible groups.

To combat infant mortality the church in Brazil organized the "children's pastoral movement" to accompany poor families throughout the country. Each month in local church communities, we weigh the babies and small children to age 06, encourage healthier living and improved nutrition as malnutrition is still common in developing countries. We divide whatever food donations we receive that month: beans, rice, macaroni, powdered milk and distribute the packages to these families. I think of our Assumption can drives at these moments and the generous spirit of the volunteers.

I was asked to begin English classes and now have five classes and after five years some are quite fluent. At least this will offer them better employment opportunities or greater possibility of passing the university entrance exams.

Unfortunately, drugs and violence continue to take the lives of too many young people. We often have peace walks and disarmament campaigns to try to promote life and peace and to encourage youth to believe and invest in their future. Some of our sisters work with youth and in various women's groups, with women victims of violence, with women in prostitution, teaching alternate skills for earning a living.

Despite the difficulties, many do remain hope filled and radiate God's loving presence. Jesus offers "life in abundance" and this remains our hope that we can all live in peace and enjoy life more fully , wherever we are.

From Heavy Metal to Jazz

October 2, 2005 saw Assumption alumnus (1972) Joe (Larry) Coughlin return to Windsor as the featured vocalist at a Windsor Symphony Orchestra concert. At the Flower Power Pops concert Joe sang well known hits such as The Way You Look Tonight, Come Fly With Me and other standards.

Joe won the DuMaurier Search for Stars in 1979 and was named Jazz Report's Male Vocalist of the Year in 2000. Joe is a mainstay at jazz festivals, on CBC radio and TV, fronting big bands and intimate trios, as well as doing voice-over, studio and writing work. He is among a handful of male jazz singers who can perform with authority in front of a big band.

Joe, in his days at Assumption was very involved in his school and was a member of the Concert Band.

Now living in Victoria, B.C., Coughlin got his start in the heavy metal band White Heat in the late 1960s.

Joe Coughlin has been singing Jazz professionally for over 20 years while battling Multiple Sclerosis. He has recorded and performed throughout North America with the finest musicians, including jazz legends Woody Herman and Dizzy Gillespie. He has a number of albums to his credit, his latest being "Simple Pleasures", released in 1999. He was named Canadian male jazz performer of the year in 2000.

What a Walkway It Is!

While a utilitarian "garden variety" overhead walkway would have been equally as effective in ensuring the safety of pedestrians crossing Huron Church, it was felt by the political decision makers that this walkway is located at the gateway to Canada for traffic entering via the Ambassador Bridge and something more visually appealing would be in order. The pedestrian bridge is intended to be the first component of the Green Corridor project, a plan to beautify the corridor of Huron Church Road between Tecumseh Road and the University of Windsor while making it more environmentally friendly.

The Nature Bridge is a uniquely designed pedestrian overpass that highlights landscape over structural architecture in the urban environment. Bridge and access ramps are created as continuous land form contours with maximum area for trees, bushes and other vegetation. It is designed to integrate with Assumption High School educational wetlands project and new architectural upgrades to the school board offices. It also provides sites for environmental research with the University of Windsor and will incorporate examples of sustainable construction.

Safety while crossing above the roadway is guaranteed through a series of attractively formed wire enclosures alternating with panels of shatter proof and graffiti proof glass. For those using the pedestrian overpass during non-daylight hours, it is extremely well lit via the use of high intensity overhead lighting. The nighttime illumination makes the pedestrian walkway visible to drivers from quite a distance.

Are current Assumption students who need to cross Huron Church taking advantage of the pedestrian overpass? Informal discussions with a number of future alumni indicate that while some current day students opt for the convenience of crossing Huron Church at ground level and are willing to accept the risks inherent with that decision, a significant majority choose to use the overhead walkway and don't mind the few extra steps it entails. These same future alumni also indicate that the current Assumption staff provides what might be described as "incentives" for students to make the safer choice of the pedestrian bridge.

A pedestrian walkway across Huron Church at or near Girardot is a feature that could have proven useful for many years. Thankfully its time has finally arrived.

Cullen's efforts on my behalf, the belief by someone I respected that I could offer something to the world, were priceless. It boggles the mind to consider the thousands of other students that Fr. 



'56CHAMPS HONOURED



Dad started with the Juniors in 1950 after which led to a tryout for the Seniors the next season. With great speed and his size, he could run the 40 in 4.7. Fr. Armstrong saw a star lineman. Dad went on to play with the Seniors leading them as captain and making the First String All City Team three year's running.



As the last high school season came to a close Dad went on to play with the AKO Fratmen. In 1955 the team would go to the championship in Winnipeg, though losing in the 20 below zero weather. Dad was scouted by the Edmonton Eskimos and offered a try-out. During training camp Dad saw a familiar face at the sidelines. It was Father Armstrong, who while on visit to see his brother came to watch Dad try out, but his dream of the CFL was not be, as an injury would send him home.

Dad returned to football to play several seasons with the Windsor Jets. As 1961 approched, Dad was approached by a scout from the Montreal Alouettes for a tryout and jumped at the chance. Training months prior to the rookie camp, Dad would tell me he was in the best condition of his career. The coaches thought so too. He was 10f 2 out of eighty to be selected to go on to Montreal. Dad would tell me that he never made the first string but did play in some of the 61 season games. As the season came to a close, Dad was traded to Toronto and though going to training camp he would never make it to the regular season. Coming home to Windsor to get married, Dad played one more season with the Jets. And Dad, always humble of his accomplishments, would say there were better lineman than he was. In my eyes he was one of Assumption's best. He had a vision and accomplished it and still proudly displays his '61 team photo today.
